

## Finishing Touches

New pavilion, sunroom upgrade make Alumni Center more versatile

**T**he addition of a pavilion and some interior renovations will enhance the UL Lafayette Alumni Center on St. Mary Boulevard. • “Construction of the pavilion will fulfill a long-term goal of completing the courtyard area this spring,” said Sharee Broussard, Alumni Association executive director. • The pavilion and a covered walkway will be constructed over a portion of the courtyard to connect the Center’s main building with a freestanding boardroom building. Gently

sloping concrete walkways, which will improve handicap accessibility, will be added. New landscaping is also planned.

A large sunroom overlooks the courtyard. It will be modernized and reconfigured. For instance, its floor will be raised to the height of the adjacent dining room, glass walls will be replaced for more stability and increased energy efficiency, and French doors will be installed. A new service area will be constructed, making the area suitable for a wider variety of social events. The sunroom’s lighting, wiring and air conditioning will also be replaced.

These interior renovations are funded by a \$50,000 donation by Connie and Wayne Elmore of Lafayette.

“The Elmores’ donation enabled us to make the sunroom more versatile, so it can better serve the university,” Broussard said.

Upon completion of the project, the Elmores will name

the room in memory of Connie’s parents, Edmond and Myrtis McCutchan D’Aquin, and brother, William “Bill” Arthur D’Aquin.

Poché Prouet Associates Limited began the renovation and expansion project in December 2002. The unfinished second floor of the Sen. John Breaux Wing remains the last portion of the Center to be completed.

The Center is the campus home for alumni, students and friends of the university. It’s also a place where student organizations and faculty groups can meet and hold a variety of events.

It was constructed as a residence in the 1930s by the late Maurice Heymann, a Lafayette businessman who later developed the nearby Oil Center.

The UL Lafayette Alumni Association purchased the property in the 1990s. ■
